## **INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND**

The Government of Côte d'Ivoire and the Ivorian civil society have placed great hope in the Open Government Partnership (OGP) since the beginning. This led to actions and consultation activities that have enabled our country to join OGP.

In addition, as a pioneer of the Partnership in Francophone West Africa, and thanks to the help of its partners, Côte d'Ivoire is multiplying initiatives that go beyond the commitments contained in its OGP National Action Plans.

Côte d'Ivoire is strongly committed to an opening-up dynamics that is reflected in the implementation of all OGP activities, in collaboration with the Ivorian OGP Civil Society Platform (PSCI-PGO), and also its involvement in several other initiatives such as:

- The African Peer Review Mechanism (APRM);
- The Millennium Challenge Corporation (MCC);
- The Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative (EITI);
- Doing Business;
- African Growth Opportunities Act (AGOA).

This mid-term self-assessment report responds to one of the requirements of OGP to which Côte d'Ivoire has complied with since its membership in 2015, namely the development of a mid-term report on the implementation of each OGP National Action Plan. This document provides an overview of the results achieved since the publication in December 2018 of the 2018-2020 National Action Plan.

### I. National Action Plan Process

The 2018-2020 National Action Plan is the result of close collaboration between the administration, the private sector and the member organizations of the Ivorian Civil Society Platform for OGP.

The strategy for its development focused on stakeholder training sessions, public consultations and regular meetings between stakeholders to reach a consensus on the content of the Action Plan.

#### A. Training sessions

As part of the preparation of the 2018-2020 National Action Plan, two training sessions were organized for various actors involved in the preparation of the second National Action Plan (NAP 2018-2020): the first took place from 11 to 13 April 2018, and the second from 24 to 25 April 2018. This was possible, with the support of the Francophone Open Governments Support Project (PAGOF), through the financial support of the French Development Agency (AFD) and the technical support of the French Agency for International Technical Cooperation (Expertise France) and the French Media Development Agency, CFI.

As a first step, it was decided to train the trainers responsible for facilitating the public consultation sessions in the cities selected for these consultations in 2018. These sessions targeted representatives of the Public Administration and those of PSCI-PGO as well.

In a second step, the same people were trained in the use of the online platform for public consultations (**cp.ogp.gouv.ci**) in order to make it accessible to the people of Côte d'Ivoire.

#### **B.** Public consultations

Several public consultation missions for the development of the second National Action Plan were conducted by the Technical Committee and the Ivorian Civil Society Platform for OGP in Côte d'Ivoire. As early as 2017, meetings were organized in five (05) cities in Côte d'Ivoire, namely: Bondoukou, Agnibilékrou, Aboisso, Daloa and Yamoussoukro. They were supplemented by those carried out in 2018 in Bongouanou, Gagnoa and Odienné. Specifically in 2018, public consultations in the localities of Bongouanou and Gagnoa were attended by other surrounding localities representatives.

These meetings mainly aimed to imply and involve the Ivorian Civil Society in the conduct of the OGP process in Côte d'Ivoire, and more specifically to:

- (i) raise awareness of the OGP process among participants;
- (ii) discuss topics of public interest;
- (iii) collect the opinions and concerns of Civil Society in the perspective of the development of the 2018-2020 National Action Plan.

This activity was completed during the workshop in Abidjan dedicated to the consolidation of all the other consultations and also to the identification of the major problems that could be translated into commitments.

These various consultations were followed by the development and the launch, on 11 June 2018, of the online public consultations platform <a href="https://cp.ogp.gouv.ci/">https://cp.ogp.gouv.ci/</a>. The collection of the contributions on this platform ended on July 11, 2018.

## C. Development of commitments

To get consensual commitments, various activities have been carried out. In addition to public consultations, workshops involving all stakeholders helped turn the concerns identified in the various cities visited during the public consultations into proposals for commitments. These activities were necessary to ensure the relevance of the commitments regarding OGP principles.

These meetings were also useful in identifying potential departments for the implementation of commitments in agreeing with them on the feasibility of the suggested commitments for the lifecycle of the national action plan 2018-2020 period. During these meetings, specific workshops were also planned with public structures and key persons to better understand the possibilities and constraints of the different entities able to implement commitments.

Sessions with the commitment holders allowed the actors to agree on the necessary information to share with the TC-OGP for the preparation of the draft of the National Action Plan.

## D. Preparation of the Action Plan draft

The National Action Plan 2018-2020 is the result of a co-creation of the CT-OGP, the commitment holders and the Ivorian OGP Civil Society Platform. This co-creation took the form of a workshop held in Abidjan on Thursday 27 September 2018, during which participants agreed on the commitments proposal, their relevance and feasibility for the 2018-2020 period.

The co-creation process was concluded on 17 October 2018, with a multi-stakeholder meeting (CT-OGP, commitment holders) and the Ivorian OGP Civil Society Platform.

After the workshop dedicated to the drafting of the National Action Plan and before the prevalidation workshop, the draft National Action Plan was shared with the PSCI-OGP for comments and feedbacks for two (02) weeks in accordance with OGP's recommendations.

The draft of the National Action Plan 2018-2020 was shared with the Focal Point and then with the OGP Inter-ministerial Committee for adoption.

# II. Recommendations from the Independent Evaluation Mechanism (IEM)

The independent mid-term assessment report for the National Action Plan 2016-2018 was profitable during the development of the National Action Plan 2018-2020, the definition of the commitments of the second plan for the 2018-2020 period and both during the overall conduct of the process. Thus, the IRM recommendations have been crucial in the renewal in the second national action plan 2018-2020 of certain commitments or topics already included in the first plan 2016-2018.

## III. Implementation of the commitments included in the National Action Plan

This step is essentially for structures directly responsible for the implementation of these commitments. However, in accordance with its missions and the spirit of co-creation, the TC-OGP works closely with these entities and the PSCI-OGP for a better monitoring of the projects related to the different commitments.

Following the adoption of the National Action Plan on 18 December 2018, several activities have been carried out, including the official launch of the Plan on 12 April 2019 and visits to commitments holders since 28 April 2019. These visits initiated by the TC-OGP and the PSCI-OGP aim to assess progress in the implementation of each commitment. They will continue throughout the implementation of the National Action Plan.

The general state of implementation for each commitment in the National Action Plan 2018-2020 as of June 14, 2019 is provided in the following table.

# CONCLUSION, OTHER INITIATIVES AND NEXT STEPS

#### A. Lessons learned

Côte d'Ivoire's track record as a participating country in OGP is rich in lessons on open governance.

These lessons involve the general conduct of the process, public consultations for the cocreation and the development of the National Action Plan to facilitate its follow-up.

Since Côte d'Ivoire's accession to OGP, the various meetings and exchanges with peers have been instructive for the country in the field of open governance.

Some stages of the process have benefited from the experience of other countries, namely Tunisia, Liberia and France, in terms of the OGP process management, citizen participation and open data.

Similarly, meetings with the new OGP member countries (Burkina Faso, Morocco, and Senegal) were fruitful in certain specific areas for Côte d'Ivoire, in particular, open data and the modernization of public administration through the improvement of the quality of public service

In addition, Côte d'Ivoire shared its experience of collaboration between Public Administration - Civil Society and the Private Sector during the African regional meetings (Ouagadougou June 2017 Tunis November 2018 Rabat March 2019 and summits (Paris and Tbilisi).

#### B. Other initiatives

In addition to the commitments in the National Action Plan2018-2020, several actions have been undertaken by the Ivorian Government to promote open government. Among those initiatives:

- platform <a href="http://www.participationcitoyenne.gouv.ci/">http://www.participationcitoyenne.gouv.ci/</a>allowing citizens to contribute directly to the improvement of public services by submitting proposals to this end.
- the information, complaints and suggestions portal at the service of miliê citizens. (www.miliê.ci) in order to enable them to submit a request (complaint, observation, information) in the event of a citizen's dissatisfaction with a public service;
- The miliê's objective is to bring the administration closer to the user-customer of the remote taxation portal (<a href="https://e-impots.gouv.ci/">https://e-impots.gouv.ci/</a>) allowing taxpayers to declare and pay their taxes online;
- the publication of statistics on taxpayers' declarations of assets and liabilities on the website of the High Authority for Good Governance (HABG), which has been online since 2017, <a href="http://www.habg.ci/index.php">http://www.habg.ci/index.php</a>;
- Public Service Observatory (OSEP), a tripartite permanent monitoring body aimed at improving the quality of public service and making it possible to assess the efficiency and transparency of public service by listening, collecting users' complaints and monitoring their processing;
- the one-stop shop for foreign trade (GUCE), <a href="https://guce.gouv.ci/?lang=fr">https://guce.gouv.ci/?lang=fr</a> which simplifies and standardizes trade procedures, speeds up trade operations, facilitates trade and dematerializes and reduces travel for the various foreign trade actors;
- PRIME: National Program to Support Institutional Reforms and State Modernization, the components of which take into account both modernization and governance, contributes to the improvement of the State's institutional and operational capacities (human capital);
- Youth Employment Agency.

#### C. Next steps

As next steps, Côte d'Ivoire will pursue the implementation of the 2018-2020 National Action Plan, the monitoring & assessment of the commitment and its participation in the various OGP global and regional meetings.

All these steps should be based on the current report and the end-of-term assessment report of the Independent Report Mechanism as well.

#### D. Conclusion

The experience gained since Côte d'Ivoire's accession to OGP in terms of implementation and assessment allows it to easily implement the continuation of OGP process in the country. Both the administration and civil society have a better understanding of the requirements and expectations of OGP. This is a major asset for our country, which is gathering experience and maturity in addressing open governance issues.

Côte d'Ivoire is committed to continuing and expanding the actions in progress under OGP because this initiative is a great source of hope.

Côte d'Ivoire reaffirms its commitment and readiness to work with all actors and partners to improve the process at the national and international levels.
